

Anoka-Ramsey Community College Students Hit Highway to Clean-Up

On September 24, members of the Coon Rapids Campus chapter of Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society and students in the College's Environmental Science program teamed up to clean-up a two-and-a-half mile stretch of Hwy. 47 in the city of Nowthen, north of the Rum River.

The honor society chapter has an agreement with the Minnesota Department of Transportation to clean up a section of the roadway at least twice a year. Board members market the event and schedule volunteers and transportation. This semester's Adopt-A-Highway clean-up resulted in the collection of 29 large bags of trash.
